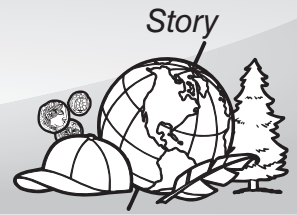

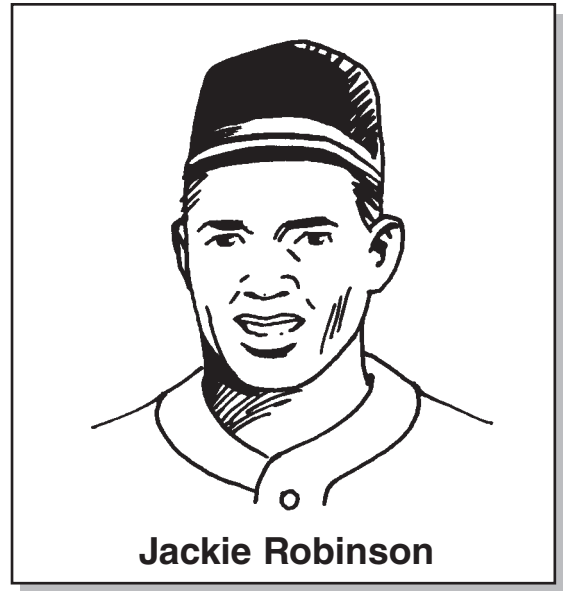
Guts Enough Not to Fight Back



Branch Rickey wanted a baseball player. The baseball player needed something. The player needed “guts enough not to fight back.” Jackie Robinson was that player.

Robinson was born in 1919. He was born in Georgia. His grandparents had been slaves. He was a hard worker. He knew how to keep his temper. Robinson was a player with guts enough not to fight back.

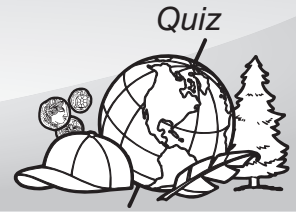
Before Robinson, black and white players did not play together. Whites played on their own teams. Blacks played on their own teams. Some people wanted to change this. They wanted to make baseball a true team sport. Rickey was the president of a white team. The team was the Brooklyn Dodgers. Rickey asked Robinson to play on his team. The year was 1945.



Many people were mad. They were angry. They did not want black and white players on the same team. Rickey knew that people would be mad. He knew they would be cruel. He knew they would fight. That is why Rickey needed a player with “guts enough not to fight back.”

What would happen if Robinson fought back? If Robinson fought back, it would prove to some people that white and black players could not get along. It would prove that white and black players could not be on the same teams. People were very cruel to Robinson. They hit him. They threw balls at him. They called him names. They sent him mean letters. They tried to stick their sharp shoe spikes into him. Robinson did not lose his temper. He did not hit back. He did not call anyone names. Robinson fought back in a different way. He fought back by playing even harder. He hit lots of balls. He stole bases. He helped his team. His team began to win and win. Robinson became a hero. He showed everyone that baseball is a true team sport. Today, baseball players of all colors play together. Robinson had the guts to show people how.
