The Sick Lion

Passage #9

- 1. This story teaches that when you act selfishly, you will eventually suffer. (*2 points*) The owl acted selfishly when he took the tiger lily (*2 points*), but then the other animals punished him for doing it. (*2 points*)
- 2. He assumed he was the most beautiful bird (*1 point*), and he stole the tiger lily. (*1 point*)
- 3. The owl can only see well at night. (*1 point*) The owl doesn't fly during the day. (*1 point*) The owl must live apart from the other birds. (*1 point*)
- 4. They would be trying to teach people not to steal (2 points) and not to act selfishly. (2 points)

Passage #10

- 1. This folktale teaches that a true friend will not desert you even in the face of danger. (*2 points*) The bear tells this to the man on the ground. (*2 points*) The first man is not a true friend because he only thinks about his own safety and does nothing to help the man on the ground. (*2 points*)
- 2. He was probably afraid that the bear would kill him. (*1 point*) He thought that he would be safer up a tree than on the ground. (*1 point*)
- 3. He couldn't fight the bear alone. (*1 point*) He didn't want the bear to eat him. (*1 point*) He pretended to be dead because he had heard that a bear will not eat a dead body. (*2 points*)
- 4. He would have tried to defend himself and his friend. (*2 points*) Perhaps together they could have driven the bear off. (*1 point*)

Passage #11

- This story teaches that sometimes others say charming things just to get something from you. (2 points) In the conversation between a bull and a panther, the panther tells the bull that he is beautiful except that his horns ruin his appearance. (2 points) In truth, the panther just wants the bull to get rid of the horns so he can attack and eat him. (2 points)
- 2. The panther wanted to charm the bull into thinking that he would look better without horns so that the bull would get rid of his horns. (*2 points*) The panther wanted the bull to have no horns because the panther was afraid of being injured by them. (*1 point*)
- 3. The panther said they ruined his appearance (*1 point*) and the bull believed the panther. (*1 point*) The bull wanted to be better-looking. (*1 point*)
- 4. The bull should have ignored the panther's comments. (*1 point*) The bull should have realized that he looks the way a bull is supposed to look. (*2 points*)

Passage #12

- 1. This folktale teaches that just because everyone else is doing something, doesn't make it the right thing to do. (*2 points*) All the other animals are visiting the lion, and the fox is pressured by the hyena to visit, too. (*2 points*) The fox wisely refuses because he realizes that the animals are being eaten by the lion. (*2 points*)
